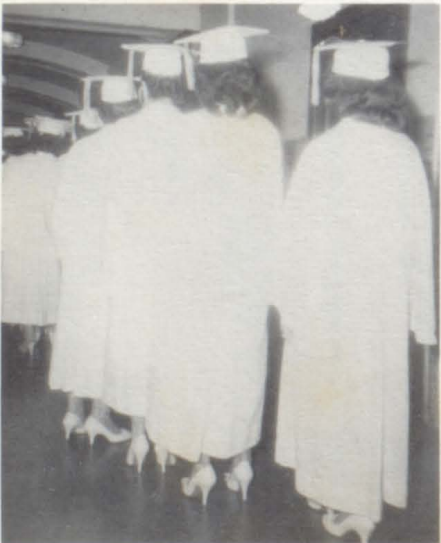

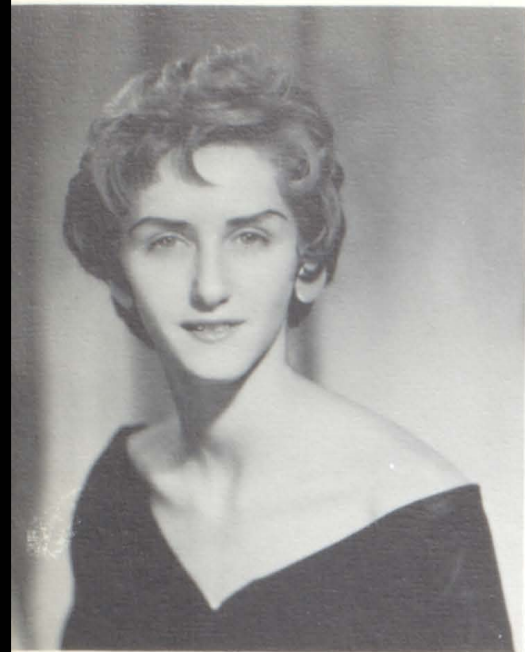
This latest equipment attracts the attention of PHYLLIS MEOLA, VINCENZA RISOLI, and KATHERINE DEMATTEO.

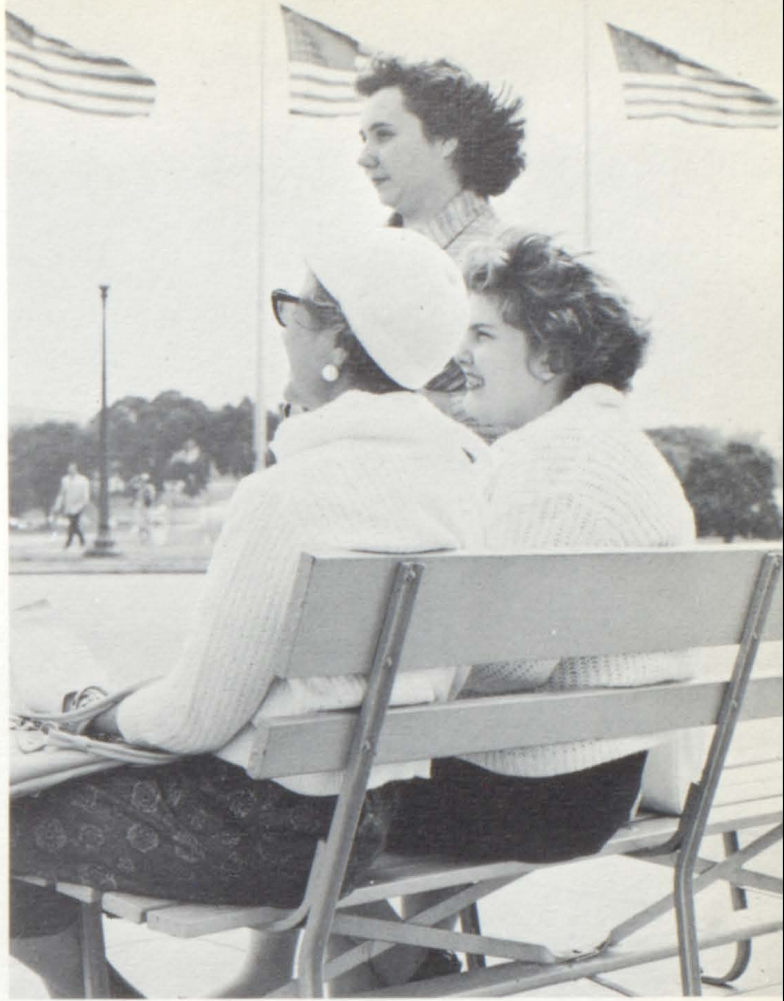
WASHINGTON, OUR NATION'S CAPITAL,

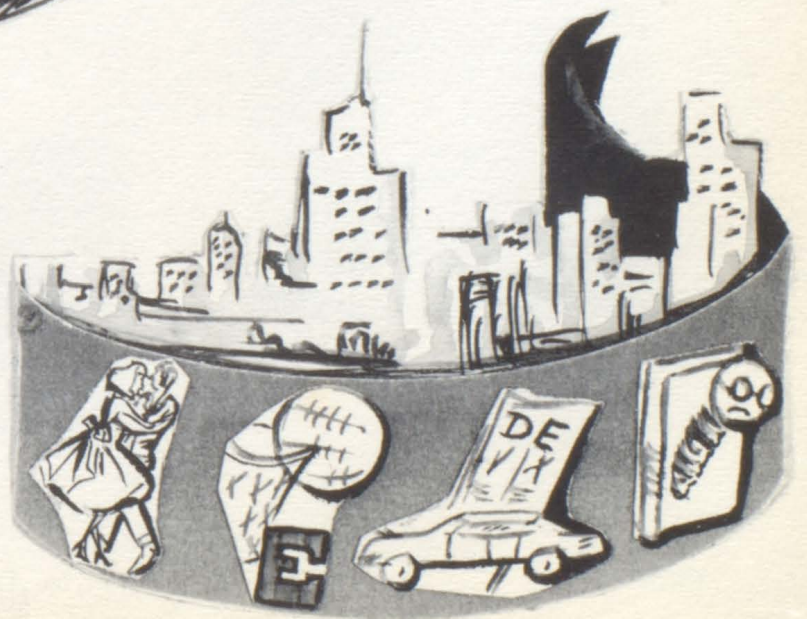

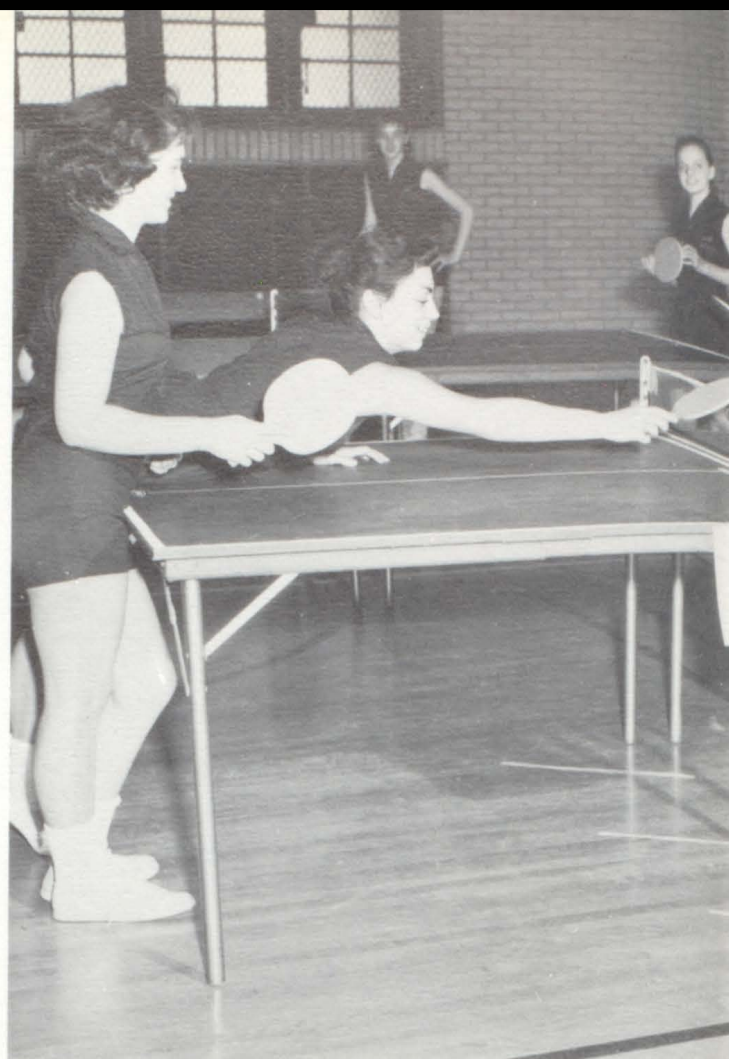

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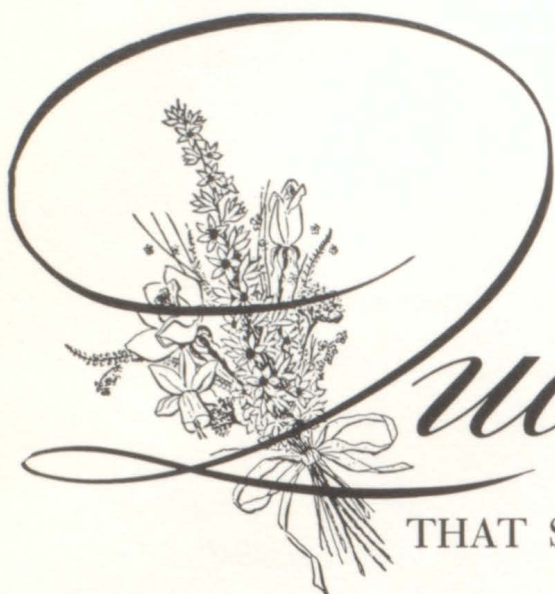
